The State of Our City

To Mayor Allen, City Board of Directors, Residents and Employees of the City of Siloam Springs:

Once again this year, it is a privilege to present the City's Annual Report to you. This publication gives each of us an opportunity to review the accomplishments of the past year and to look toward the goals and objectives for 2011.

Because we are part of a national economy where growth continues to be sluggish, city governments like ours remain diligent in our effort to evaluate programs, expenditures, and policies to address this critical time in our history. Fortunately, the City took action several years ago to streamline our processes and position ourselves financially to weather the economic challenges we are facing.

The past year, although demanding, has proven to be one of our most productive. We remained fiscally conservative and worked hard to keep expenditures low, yet were still able to expand our infrastructure with the creation

of new revenue streams (e.g., SWEPCO water sales and utility services provided to West Siloam Springs, Oklahoma).

Each year, City leadership works to present a balanced budget, which requires cutting capital projects and operating costs, justifying every budgeted dollar, and then reviewing once again to see if more cuts are possible. City-wide and simply stated, employees have learned to collaborate and produce more with less.

As your City Administrator, my challenge is to ensure that budget cuts in our operations do not jeopardize the quality of the services we provide to you. In fact, it is routine these days to read stories of communities that are cutting services in order to balance their budgets. I am pleased to report that the City of Siloam Springs is not a part of that discussion. Instead, we are looking for ways to build and improve the services we currently provide. This year, hard work and careful financial planning have led to a \$1.1 million surplus, which we were able to return to our reserve account---a major achievement in the current economic environment.

As we cope with challenges, we also look for opportunities.

We are determined to use this time to plan wisely for our future. We are developing smart strategies and clear objectives and are including residents, local business and industry in our deliberative processes.

In 2010, we created a city-wide strategic plan to direct our activity for the next five years. Each department also outlined specific goals and needs, allowing us to better plan for the months and years ahead. It is likely that we will face tougher decisions as we continue to tackle the important responsibility of guiding the City of Siloam Springs into this new decade.

Mayor Allen and the City Board of Directors deserve our gratitude for their contribution and commitment in 2010. They were confronted with many difficult decisions: an electric rate increase, removal of the existing Maple Street Bridge, as well as a plan for the new bridge; whether or not to pursue the purchase of buildings and land, etc.

Danny Wasson recently completed his term as Director for Ward Three. Director Wasson has been an instrumental part of our local government for the last

six years. We thank him for his service and wish him well. We also want to extend a hearty welcome to newly elected Ward Three Director, Ken Krafft, and look forward to his service on the Board and his continuing commitment to the City. Last but certainly not least, we extend our thanks to the residents who have volunteered and served on various boards and commissions the past year. Building effective communication with the public will continue to be a priority, as will increasing public participation in our local government and its processes.

A vital link to the City's success is the vision, loyalty, and enthusiasm of our employees. I am consistently impressed by the talented and experienced people that I am privileged to call my co-workers. It is the mission of every employee to exceed the expectations of our citizens, through the delivery of effective, courteous, and responsive services. We continue our pursuit of that mission, each and every day.

The past year brought positive news regarding several large projects. Sager Creek Phase II is now a reality, Highway 412 is being expanded and the new high school is taking form east of town. Tahlequah Street's Phase I and II are complete, providing a much needed additional route through a growing part of our community. The airport was upgraded this year,

largely due to approved grant funding. John Brown University continues to grow and expand. In April we collaborated with JBU and the Walton Family Foundation to introduce the new portion of Dogwood Springs Trail. We welcomed a new Aldi's and Tractor Supply Company to Highway 412, as well as several other new businesses to offer more local products and services to you.

The New Year brings a new focus to our planned projects. We welcome the opening of the high school this fall and look forward to the construction of the new hospital on Progress Avenue. Work continues on an electric transmission line loop and substation that will provide additional dependability of the city's electric services for many years. The Wastewater Treatment Plant will soon be complete, preparing the city to meet ever-increasing governmental regulation. The investigation of new revenue streams will continue, as the city researches the possibility of its own cable communication system and future sustainability projects. We also have plans in place to build a soccer complex near the new high school as funding becomes available.

The City and Chamber of Commerce continue to actively pursue new economic development opportunities. The Board of Directors passed new incentives by ordinance in 2010, helping existing businesses grow and attracting new industries to the area. Doing what we

can to help create more and better jobs will continue to be a top priority for our future success.

The accomplishments outlined in the following pages of this report are just a sampling of the projects your local government has helped to execute. We are fortunate indeed to be part of a community of extraordinary people who lend a hand in shaping this City's future. Residents are happy to call Siloam Springs their home; others visit and after seeing what we have to offer, choose to relocate here. We believe the City of Siloam Springs will continue to make a meaningful difference in the Northwest Arkansas region and the nation as a whole, and look forward to all that the New Year brings. Wishing each of you every success in 2011!

2011 Budget



The Siloam Springs Board of Directors adopts an annual budget in December of each year. The budget may be amended throughout the year by the Board of Directors to address unanticipated revenues and expenditures. The annual budget document is developed based upon a Strategic Plan that incorporates both organizational and departmental goals for the coming year.

The city's annual budget is a financial plan and an expression of financial intent used as one method of providing fiscal or financial fund control. The budget identifies and documents the proposed expenditures for the year and the means of funding or financing them.

Financial Overview

UNDERSTANDING CITY BUDGET FUNDS

The **General Fund** is an important and visible fund as it is the fund used to operate most government services (Police, Fire, Parks and Recreation, Library, etc.).

Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditure for specific purposes. The City of Siloam Springs has only one special revenue fund, which is the Street Department.

Restricted Funds, which may include specific capital projects, are used to account for cash, revenue proceeds and other assets that have been restricted for authorized use by legal, administrative or legislative decree.


Enterprise Funds are used to account for operations financed and operated similarly to private business enterprises where the intent is that the cost of providing the service to customers is financed through user charges. Enterprise funds for the City of Siloam Springs include Electric, Water, Wastewater, Solid Waste and the Airport.

Internal Service Funds are used to account for any activity that provides goods or services to other funds or departments of the city on a cost – reimbursement basis. Internal Service funds include Maintenance and Engineering.

Fiduciary Funds are used to report assets held in a trustee or agency capacity for others and therefore cannot be used to support the city's own programs. An example of a Fiduciary Fund is the Firemen's Pension.




The Utility Billing Office processes accounts for the utility services provided to our customers including electricity, water, wastewater, and trash service.

The city has approximately 7,000 customers who are billed in one of two billing cycles per month. The Utility Billing Office is responsible for annual billing and collections of approximately \$27,357,055.

The functional responsibilities of the **Finance Department** are diverse and broad in scope. Primary responsibilities include cash management, bonding of debt, investment of public funds, annual budget development and management, general ledger accounting and financial reporting for all city departments and funds, payroll, purchasing and accounts payable.

Finance staff is responsible for the appropriate accounting, proper recording, and financial reporting of approximately \$42.3 million dollars in revenue and \$59.3 million dollars in expenditures across 17 departments and nine funds city-wide.

This enables us to not only give better information and status updates to EMS personnel, but also have the ability to guide individuals through CPR, childbirth, and clearing an obstructed airway.

The **Siloam Springs Fire Department** serves an area of approximately 200 square miles in Northwest Arkansas and Northeast Oklahoma. The department includes paramedic ambulance service, fire suppression, rescue, hazard mitigation, fire inspections and fire safety education. These services are provided by 39 full-time, two part-time, and six administrative members. Fire Department operations are managed from three stations. The **Electric Department** has a staff of 27 employees and provides service to approximately 7,000 customers. The department has an annual summer peak of 60 megawatts and annual kilowatt-hour sales of 250 million kilowatts. Our service area is 22 square miles.

The City of Siloam Springs has 170 miles of distribution power lines, of which 30% are underground. In addition, the city has six miles of 69kV transmission lines. The Electric Department maintains four electric substations and 16 traffic signals throughout Siloam Springs.

Over the past five years, an average of 7.6 power poles have been damaged or broken each year after being struck by vehicles.

The City of Siloam Springs Electric Department has received reliability awards from the Municipal Electric Systems of Oklahoma (MESO) for six of the last seven years. More than 75 other electric departments compete for this award.



North Transmission Line

A new electric transmission line loop and substation is under construction north of Siloam Springs. The Siloam Springs #3 North 69kV Transmission Line will provide a second point connection and is an important step in supporting ever-increasing system loads and will also drastically improve system reliability. The new line and substation, located on Country Club Road, will add reliability and give the Electric Department the capability of performing de-energized periodic maintenance on critical equipment. This added capacity will provide continued service during emergencies, such as equipment failure or storms.

Much time and effort will go into the new transmission line in 2011. Crews will continue with easement acquisitions and with clearing the rights-of-way for construction. Construction will begin in the next few months.

Public Works

The **Engineering Department** works in conjunction with the planning, parks, street, water and wastewater divisions, as well as outside contractors, to provide internal surveying, engineering design and construction administration. The department also reviews development proposals to ensure each new development activity has adequate infrastructure and meets the city's minimum engineering design criteria.

The Engineering Department provided technical assistance on many projects this year, including the construction of Tahlequah Street Phase I and II, the asphalt overlay of Tulsa Street, the relocation of the Sager Creek fountains, designing a replacement for the low-water bridge on Maple Street and the repair of the failed section of rock wall along Sager Creek.

Staff also performed construction administration, surveying and engineering design for many drainage, water and sewer projects, as well as provided surveying assistance for the acquisition of numerous easements and properties for the city.

Due to the many drainage issues the community faces, much focus will be placed on establishing a Master Drainage Plan in 2011. Drainage issues will be prioritized and funding needs will be established.

In addition, it is expected the 2010 Census will classify Siloam Springs as a Municipal Separate Storm Water System (MS4) requiring the reduction of storm water pollutant discharges into local streams. Staff is preparing to meet the responsibilities of this designation by engaging in a multi-faceted approach to improving water quality.

The **Water Services Department** is responsible for repairing all leaks and breaks in the city's water and sewer distribution lines, identifying lines that need to be replaced, laying new water/sewer lines, and assuring that the integrity of the water is maintained throughout the water distribution system.

In addition to responding to more than 3,262 service calls in 2010, the department located and mapped approximately 80% of the entire water distribution system, identified 27 miles of aged lines for future replacement, and relocated the Maple Street Bridge water line through six feet of solid limestone. Crews also relocated and improved the Sager Creek fountain pumps.

Plans for 2011 include the mapping of the sewer system and actively working to identify and reduce storm water inflow and infiltration areas.

The **Water Department** is responsible for the safe distribution of potable water to residents, businesses and industries in Siloam Springs.

Notable accomplishments in 2010 include the treatment of more than 1 billion gallons of water. This is an average of 4.99 million gallons per day.

Water Department goals for 2011 include the maintenance and repainting of the Armory Water Tower, the cleaning and inspection of the North Water Tower, and moving forward with plans for the eventual expansion of the water plant and construction of a new raw water line.

The **Wastewater Department** is responsible for assuring that all wastewater has been treated and meets all state and federal requirements when it leaves the plant for release into Sager Creek.

The first phase of construction improvements at the new wastewater treatment plant were completed in 2010. The \$24 million plant upgrade has improved efficiency and drastically reduced phosphorous loads and ammonia nitrates as required by new state and federal regulations. Four million dollars was contributed by the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act to the project. Improvements to the plant will be complete in 2011.

The **Street Department** takes on multiple special projects each year, mows all the rights-of-way throughout the city and collects brush. Crews also maintain street signs, drainage, street sweeping, and conduct mosquito fogging in the summer.

In 2010, the Street Department completed the Tahlequah Street extension between Country Club and Progress Avenue. Crews also completed work on the Sager Creek Phase II restoration project and built a regional detention pond at the airport. By completing these and other projects internally, more than \$150,000 was saved.

In 2011, Sue Anglin Drive is anticipated to be completed. Several drainage improvements are planned throughout Siloam Springs, as well as a major crack sealing program for city streets.

Public Works



The **Community Development Department** facilitates the building permit process and conducts inspections. Code Enforcement and Planning are also divisions of the department. Staff assists property owners, residents and developers with planning and building review processes, while encouraging an attractive community and planning for Siloam Springs future needs.

The **Code Enforcement Division** devoted much time in 2010 to developing a successful working rapport with property management institutions to coordinate property maintenance for vacant foreclosure residences. The number of foreclosures increased approximately 70% from last year, resulting in a significant number of unattended homes and lawns.

The **Solid Waste Department** is responsible for twice weekly curbside bagged trash pickup, once weekly bagged yard waste pickup, dumpster and roll off container service, and spring and fall cleanup. More than 29,763.21 tons of trash and debris were sent to a landfill in 2010 for a total cost of \$970,280.64.

In 2010, the **Recycling Division** collected, processed, and baled more than 770 tons of newspaper, cardboard, glass, plastic bottles, aluminum, tin and scrap metal. This is an increase of 80,632 lbs since 2009. By recycling all these materials, we were able to save \$25,121 in landfill fees.



The **Siloam Springs Public Library** strives to provide excellent materials and programming to the public for their personal enrichment, enjoyment, and educational/informational needs.



Oak Hill Cemetery currently averages 70 to 80 interments per year. Three full time employees manage and maintain the 32.5 acre cemetery.

The cemetery entrance has recently been enhanced with an angel statue and a 72 niche columbarium. New signage has been installed at each of the four entrances, and the chapel has received new solid wood doors and attractive hardware.

In the coming year, we plan to continue our research and design of an informational brochure for those interested in learning more about the cemetery's history and future plans. Our burial records and fee/rate schedule are available at www.siloamsprings.com.
