- THANK YOU FOR POSTING THIS SURVEY! I am so grateful I stumbled across it. My household and I moved to Siloam Springs 3 months ago. We don't know where to go for reliable or comprehensive city/community information. Perhaps a community info welcome packet mailed to new homeowners moving into the area would serve as a great communication tool to boost familiarity with what is available in Siloam Springs and with what services occur, when and how? When does solid waste pick up occur? Until this survey we had no idea there was a spring and fall clean up program or pick up. What is that? What is a monthly yard waste pick up program? Where are city parks that are not soggy water catchment lots? What are the best and most reliable employment sites and resources for the community area? Our experience has been a lack of communication and reliable sources that provide explanation or helpful details about the community. We are familiar with the Social Media pages and even the city's online community site. But, we have found these to be lacking in helpful information. For instance, we were very excited about the Christmas parade, but try as we might we could not find any parade route information or map. The only info we could find was a start time and start point, and an end point. But nothing outlined what route the parade would take to get from start to end. It was very frustrating. We are very slowly having our eyes opened to what the wonderful little community

of Siloam Springs has to offer. It would be nice to know that there are important community services and projects available. Is there a City of Siloam newsletter that goes out to community member mail boxes? Could there be? A welcome packet and monthly newsletter would be helpful for my household. Would it be for other households as well?
